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PRESIDENT'S REPORT Mark Alexander

Welcome to the 2023 Annual Report of the Association of Hydraulic Services Consultants Australia (the Association).

As members are aware, there have been some changes to the leadership of the Association since our last Annual Report.

The Board of Directors elected at the last Annual General Meeting resigned from their respective positions and the members elected a new executive team at the Special General Meeting in April this year.

I am privileged to be elected to serve my fifteenth term as the Victorian or National President/Chairman, and I am proud to be leading such an experienced executive team. I want to thank them all for putting themselves forward for election.

See page 7 for details of the make-up of your new leadership team and their experience in the industry and with the Association.

The new Board member's experience and knowledge will be key to enabling the Association to get on with the core business of supporting its members. Their leadership experience will also help increase the Association's sector wide connectivity by strengthening, and more effectively utilising our established connections with other key entities and partners such as the Master Plumbers Association, PICAC, VBA and the Water authorities.

The Board I lead will prioritise member communications and information. We plan to develop more targeted, informative, and relevant member communications, especially as it relates to important regulatory or government policy level changes or proposals which could directly impact members.

In terms of the way the Association operates, the new executive team is committed to an open and consultative Association, where members are consulted about key decisions which affect them (such as meeting dates and venues; awards and nominations etc).

Connection, communication, and consultation. These are always very important, but with some potentially significant regulatory and policy level changes in the future, clear and accurate member information is more important than ever. For example, the regulation and certification of complex plumbing work will, I anticipate, be the subject of industry consultation over the next 12 or so months, and substantial reforms are expected. We have advocated hard for reform to this part of the regulatory framework for more than a decade, and the added certification responsibilities that will be experienced by our members will be significant.

The regulatory framework for our industry is subject to continuous review and updating. The Association is committed to ensuring that as regulations and practitioner categories are reviewed and updated, the previous training and experience of our membership is recognised in any new practitioner categories.

The longer term educational structures for those entering the hydraulic design field will also be imperative and we will need to work in close association with our broader industry partners to develop tertiary qualifications for the industry.

The Association has also been working with the Master Plumbers on a proposal to establish a Plumbing Appeals and Modifications Board (PAMB). As members know, plumbing work must comply with the performance requirements of the Plumbing Code of Australia (PCA). This can be achieved using the deemed-to-satisfy (prescriptive) method, a Performance Solution, or a combination of both.

An issue which has been identified (by the AHSCA and the Master Plumbers) is that there is no formal body currently undertaking audit reviews on Performance Solutions. As a result, this segment of the industry is operating without any effective oversight. This presents a risk for our members, the broader industry, and the community.

As our members appreciate, assessing the extent to which a Performance Solution meets the PCA can be complex, and involve interpretation of design guides, regulations, and related referenced documents. The role of the PAMB would include reviewing Performance Solutions (retrospectively in an audit scenario or to guide industry trends and outcomes) and provide regulatory interpretations and clarifications referred to it by the VBA, AHSCA, Master Plumbers or any other industry body (or individual). The PAMB would then issue consolidated formal interpretations of the regulations and referenced documents to assist the industry.

It is envisaged the PAMB would draw expertise from a panel of industry representatives and experts much like the Building Appeals Board and can operate under the current provisions of the Building Act.

A final point on Performance Solutions is an important reminder to members. Please keep in mind that works may be retrospectively audited with the current 10 year obligations for practitioners likely to continue.

Change is coming in terms of the external accountability context in which we operate, and within the Association.

We are responsible for the integrity of our own organisation and a key part of that is ensuring our membership classifications are accurate and up to date. That is why, moving forward, regular reviews and checks will be undertaken. My expectation is that all members co-operate fully with any review and note that most voting members will have their classification reviewed in the upcoming year.

One of the objectives of the incoming Executive is to streamline as many processes as possible, and to develop auxiliary support to reduce to burden for future Association volunteers. It is hoped a reduced workload will encourage more members to nominate for Board positions.

As part of that initiative, the Board has appointed an Operations Manager and a Business Manager. Former multi term President and Life Member Bob Thorgersen has been appointed as Operations Manager and his role will involve liaising with the Board of Directors; and working closely with the new Business Manager, David Geschke.

David, who is also the Treasurer of the AHSCA Research Foundation and was recently appointed to the Board of the Master Plumbers, will work closely with other members of the executive team to ensure the Association is efficient and financially sustainable.

I would like to acknowledge and congratulate Mark Pearson, Geschke Plumbing Contractors and Greg Brittain from Zip Water who were the worthy recipients of the AHSCA Awards at the Plumbing and Fire Protection Industry

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Awards held in Melbourne in March. The AHSCA awards, Consultant of the Year, Commercial Plumbing Affiliate of the Year and the Sales Representative of the Year are all very significant to Association members and have been enshrined in the Association's rules, guaranteeing that any future proposals for change need to be approved by the broader membership.

I encourage members to read the articles inside this Report about the individual winners and the attributes and qualities which drive their success.

Thank you to all members and corporate sponsors who continued their support to the Association. I also want to thank all the executive team members, outgoing and incoming, and others involved in organising technical and other presentations and guest speakers over the course of the year to June 2023.

Thank you to the Association members for giving me the opportunity to once again contribute, at Board level, to the AHSCA's growth and ongoing success.

I am extremely passionate about the AHSCA, having served in a variety of roles over the past decade or so, including Treasurer, Junior Vice President and three terms of President. 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
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TREASURER'S REPORT

It was my great privilege to be elected Treasurer of the AHSCA at the Special General Meeting of the Association in April 2023. My thanks go to the members of our Association for giving me the opportunity to once again serve an organisation I have been passionate about for most of my working life.

I was first elected to the Board of the Association all the way back in 1994, when I was elected to the position then known as Junior Vice President. Over the subsequent decade to 2004 I served four terms as Junior VP and several terms as Senior VP. After a period away from a formal role with the Association I am now very pleased to return to the Board in the role of Treasurer.

In this my first report to members as Treasurer, my key message is that the Association is in a sound financial position. The Association's robust financial governance culture and practices mean that the AHSCA has the resources available to it to ensure it can continue to deliver the high-quality guest speakers and information sessions our members want.

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AHSCA RESEARCH FOUNDATION CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The AHSCA Research Foundation has had continued supporting our members through of course of 2022/23 with noteworthy outcomes and activities including:

- AHSCARF remains largely as a selffunded body other than for specific research projects requiring member contributions.
- Thank you to Mark Alexander for representing the organisations interests on the Australian standard committee for AS3500. Submissions relating to proposed updates and amendments to Part 3 - stormwater drainage, were comprehensive and we await the standard committees formal review of this contribution. We have advocated an approach that supports test-based research methods to support important amendments to ensure that the standards will serve our profession well and assist in delivering robust low risk design outcomes.
- In support of increasing usage and the mainstream revenue streams for the foundation, training has been undertaken in 2023 with members across Australia attending the online advanced roof drainage courses. It has become clear from members, that online training is preferred and avoids multi day travel commitments, reducing the training costs for our members. This will likely remain unless an in-person attendance is requested by members.
- Thank you to the Victorian chapter for contributing funds to support a pilot copper internal corrosion observation project. Whilst there remains work to progress this project, it will be a simple observational process over 1-2 years to highlight the emerging internal corrosion issues that are being encountered by our members with some regularity. There remains a lot of interest in this project from our members and we will report outcomes in an ongoing fashion.

- There has been limited progress on navigating a path forward with respect to education services that produce recognised qualifications for hydraulic design practitioners. Not withstanding registration categories that are emerging in NSW and the Victorian complex plumbing initiative that may create formal requirements for designer registrations, we remain committed to promoting a formal education and certification scheme for hydraulic designers. As with large institutional issues, progress is slow but there does appear movement particularly with long term state government stability in some member states.
- The roof drainage test rig located at the University of Sunshine Coast (UniSC) is no longer in play and being removed from the university campus. We thank USC for hosting the rig significantly longer than its intended life expectancy.

 The New Zealand members of AHSCA have progressed their membership and meeting schedule, lead by Nick Fleckney. They have a plan to build more structure in their meeting arrangements and are in regular dialogue with us.

We thank the Victorian chapter for your support and hope that the rest of 2023 is successful notwithstanding the challenges of high construction costs, state debt, and lending costs that may challenge the market in the coming period. We will continue to represent the interests of the AHSCA collective in Australia and New Zealand.

I am very pleased to have the opportunity to serve on the Board of the AHSCA in the role of Plumbing Affiliate Representative.

My thanks go to the members of the Association for electing me to the position. I also wish to thank Mark Alexander and my fellow Board members for the chance to work along side them in the executive team.

I see my role as Plumbing Affiliate
Representative as being both important
and muti-faceted. It is important
because the relationship between
plumbers and designers is symbiotic.
Both need the other to succeed for
the desired outcomes to be achieved.

My role is about facilitating that collaborative and mutually beneficial dynamic. It is about communication, representation, and relationship building. A key element of the role is to be the primary point of contact for the Association's plumbing affiliate members, and to raise any issues they have at a Board level.

As a conduit between plumbing affiliate members and the broader designer membership, my job is also to liaise with the designers; to and understand issues from their perspective; and to convey key information to plumbing affiliate members.

Open communication between members and building a culture where all members feel they have a voice and can express concerns or ideas, is key to the ongoing success of the Association. In my view the Association has in place the right executive team to ensure communication lines - in particular between designers and plumbers - remain open and productive. The Board is focused on sharpening our communications further, and providing information and technical expertise and advice to members which is targeted and specific to our part of the broader construction sector.

And, if the first meeting of the Association under the new Board in June this year is any indication, we are on the right track in this regard. The overwhelming feedback from the meeting was that members found it to be valuable and productive, and that the speakers were on point and the presentations included the right amount of technical information for what is a sophisticated group of professionals.

The provision of technically relevant industry specific presentations is a valuable and important part of the AHSCA.

However, meetings of the Association also provide an opportunity for informal dialogue between members, which, in my experience, is where the real value of the Association lies.

In a commercial context in which communications between designers and plumbers is very structured, and usually requires all communications to be via the builder, the Association provides a welcome opportunity to directly address issues and to problem solve through dialogue. I have personally

had the experience, and I know other members have too, of talking direct to my colleagues from the design sector at an AHSCA meeting or event and resolving an issue which would have taken much longer and been more administratively burdensome to deal with under the contractual arrangements.

The Board of the Association understand this point and is committed to fostering an atmosphere of open dialogue and providing more opportunities for members to learn from one another, problem solve, understand the other's perspective, and share industry experiences.

Thank you again for the opportunity to contribute to the AHSCA at Board level as the Plumbing Affiliate representative.

I look forward to continuing to work with the Board and members to keep the positive momentum, which was so evident in the June meeting, going for the rest of this year and into the future.

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A major element of the Design Brief received by the Sellick Consultants hydraulic team was to reduce ongoing operational and running cost as their

client is responsible to operate, maintain and run the facility.

The AHSCA extends its congratulations to Greg Brittain from Zip Water who, for a very impressive third time, was named the AHSCA Sales Representative of the Year at the 2023 Plumbing and Fire Industry Awards.

The Award is presented to an individual who demonstrates qualities of integrity and professionalism. To win it once is impressive, but to win it multiple times (and be nominated in other years), reflects the sustained excellence Greg brings to his role, and speaks to the quality of Zip Water products and service.

The Plumbing and Fire Industry Awards (PFIAs) are a national, whole of industry initiative, co-sponsored by all the leading industry stakeholders including the Master Plumbers and Mechanical Services Association of Australia, the Plumbing and Pipe Trades Employees Union, the National Fire Industry Association, the Association of Hydraulic Service Consultants Australia, and the Plumbing Industry Climate Action Centre.

The Awards recognise excellence and the achievements of individuals and companies across the country and across the various disciplines and elements of the broad and diverse sector.

Being recognised at the PFIAs by the Industry for the quality of his work, and his approach to clients, is something Greg is extremely proud of:

"It is great to receive the award and the recognition. The best part about it is it is good for your confidence and good for the company. It's a signal that what we are doing is valued within the Industry, and that our approach to our work - which is all about being direct and open with people and following through and doing what we say will do - is being well received."

From a background in sales rather than hydraulic engineering or plumbing, Greg came to the sector about nine years ago when he took a sales role with Zip Water: "I was working in the broader retail space, selling a range of products including plumbing products. That's where I connected with the folks at Zip Water. I really rate the Zip Water products, and the people there and thought I'd give it a try".

"I knew next to nobody in the Industry when I started in this role. I'm not a plumber and I'm not a hydraulic engineer, so I was a little unsure about how that would all work. But I was worrying about nothing. Everyone was welcoming, and open to building relationships and delivering better products and services for clients. It is a great Industry in that way, and I have met a lot of great people, many of whom are now good personal friends as well as colleagues".

For Greg, doing well in a sales role is all about good relationships, and a great product:

"We sell very high-quality instant boiling, chilled and sparkling water solutions in a wide range of commercial, health, community, and residential settings".

"Our products are often "specified in" to contracts, so high is the level of designer confidence in what we deliver. That definitely helps me succeed in my role".

The AHSCA, and the relationships, connections, and industry intelligence he has picked up by being involved with the Association, is also cited by Greg as being pivotal to his success: "Soon after taking the sales role with Zip, I joined the AHSCA. I am very glad I did.

Through their meetings and events, I met hydraulic designers, and got to understand them and their requirements.

In a relaxed setting, I got to meet people where they are at, and to talk and interact in a way which was not like a work meeting. The AHSCA members are not going to meetings to make deals, but to understand what others in the sector are doing, what are their challenges, what are the big regulatory changes coming and so on etc. It has been very valuable for me and given me the chance to get to really understand how the Industry works.

Greg is very positive about the "opening up" of the Association to include more plumbers, sales representatives, and other relevant Industry participants: "I think Mark Alexander and the others involved have done a great thing extending the membership beyond hydraulic engineers. It is all about collaboration at the end of the day".

"The designers and the plumbers both want a good outcome for the consumer, and so do we. We all need to be working together, not against each other".

"It makes sense that at an Industry Association level we seek to embed that collaborative approach".

In March of 2023, at the annual Plumbing and Fire Industry Awards, Mark Pearson, of LCI Consulting Pty Ltd was awarded the AHSCA Tom Clements Consultant of The Year Award.

The Award, which this year was sponsored by Halgan Pty Ltd, is held in very high regard by AHSCA members and the Plumbing and Fire Protection Industry more broadly. The Consultant of the Year Award is presented to "a consultant who has demonstrated qualities of integrity and professionalism", and in the AHSCA's view, there could not be a more fitting winner than Mark Pearson.

Mark's integrity and professionalism have underpinned his 30 plus year career in hydraulic engineering. When interviewed by the AHSCA about receiving the Award, Mark is characteristically humble: "It is nice to be recognised in this way. I have always sought to be straight and professional with everyone I deal with in the industry. Doing what you said you would do and working with people to find solutions to complex or unexpected

problems, that is probably the key thing for me and what integrity and professionalism is all about".

Receiving an award struck in the name of Tom Clements brings a deep sense of pride and synergy for Mark: "Tom Clements made a huge contribution to our industry, so it is a great honour to receive an award named after him. In fact, Tom was presiding as President when I first attended a meeting of the Association which was then known as NAPCI. That was all the way back in 1990. And it was Tom Clements who signed my membership certificate (Certificate Number 77). So, receiving the Tom Clements Award means a great deal to me".

Mark's career, which began back in the late 1980's, has seen him work on some incredible projects over the years. In the early 1990's he worked in China and Hong Kong, doing hydraulic engineering for a new Australian Embassy and then an airport. He has worked in other regions and countries also, including Dubai, and developed hydraulic engineering

solutions for a great range of public, private, corporate, health and community infrastructure developments in Australia. Mark has a wealth of technical knowledge and experience. However, when asked what makes a successful consultant, Mark steers away from his technical knowledge and design abilities, towards what we sometimes call, the softer skills:

"Years ago there was an industry survey conducted. Its purpose was to find out from plumbers and other stakeholders what they thought were the most important qualities or attributes of a good consultant. They came back with what become known as the three A's - Affability, Availability and Ability - in that order. I never forgot that, and always tried to be affable, and work with and not against people to find the best solutions".

The industry and the Association have evolved and changed significantly over the past three decades of Mark's career.

"Obviously, the advances in technology, new systems and innovations are coming into hydraulic design all the time. In that respect there is constant change".

"In terms of how the industry works, we have moved away from a fairly siloed sector - with plumbers and designers often working in isolation of each other to a more collaborative way of working. That has been a big, and very positive shift in my view".

In terms of the evolution of the AHSCA over the journey of Mark's time in the sector, he makes a similar point about collaboration and information sharing: "The Association used to be made up of consultants only. However, over the past decade or so, and Mark Alexander has made a key contribution here, we have broadened our focus".

"The AHSCA has actively sought to bring a diversity of skill sets into the Association and welcomed commercial plumbers, water utility representatives and sales representatives into the ranks of the AHSCA membership."

Having more diversity in the AHSCA membership means issues or developments can be discussed and addressed quickly and directly. It also facilitates and encourages connections with others in the sector and helps everyone in the industry to understand the pressures, challenges, and the opportunities from multiple perspectives.

"Take someone like John Geschke as just one example. He runs a highly successful commercial plumbing business and is a member of the AHSCA. John has worked with dozens of designers over the years and has enormous commercial and plumbing experience. John attends meetings and happily shares his insights with the members of the AHSCA because at the end of the day, we all want to deliver successful projects, and we need each other to achieve that".

Looking forward, Mark sees an Association and an industry in good hands, but with some big challenges ahead:

"Going forward, I think push to make regulatory changes to how complex plumbing is certified, will pose some challenges for the sector. In many respects it makes sense that plumbers should not be asked to certify work they did not design, and in theory designers should be able to certify that their designs are compliant and fit for purpose".

"However, making changes to established industry ways of working is always hard, and getting the regulatory detail right, and ensuring the lines of accountability and responsibility are drawn correctly, might make for some challenging times ahead".

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AHSCA COMMERCIAL PLUMBING AFFILIATE OF THE YEAR AWARD

Geschke Plumbing

Anyone who has been around the Australian commercial plumbing industry for a while knows Geschke Plumbing Contractors. The Geschke name has been synonymous with high quality, large scale, Tier 1 commercial plumbing for over 70 years.

It is no surprise then that the Geschke name is also a regular feature at the annual Plumbing and Fire Industry Awards. In 2023, and not for the first time, Geschke Plumbing Contractors were recognised by their peers for their excellence and professionalism, taking

home the AHSCA Commercial Plumbing Affiliate of the Year Award, sponsored this year by Caroma.

Sustained success at the leading edge of the Tier 1 commercial plumbing industry does not happen by accident. So, what is the key to the Geschke's success? Well, according to part owner John Geschke, who accepted the 2023 Award on behalf of the company he co-owns with brother Steven and Gareth Dickson, there is no one secret ingredient. Rather, there are a series of factors, both technical and attitudinal, that make Geschke a success: "It starts with our approach to all the projects we do. For me there are four things we set out to achieve with every project - safety, quality, defect free, and a commercial return. And, we find, that when you look after the first three, the commercial side tends to pan out as well".

It starts with safety. We take safety very seriously, which in part is why

our workforce is unionised. I don't ever want to see anyone injured or worse on one of our jobs. The safety of everyone on site and in the workshop is always a key focus for us.

We ensure quality by making sure we invest time and resources at the beginning of projects to get the drawings right and making sure we are on the same page as the designer.

We do all our own drawings. We take the design drawings and then model it using ACAD and REVIT and make sure that the integrity of the design is retained and that we can meet the specs. Every dollar and every hour we spend at the beginning of projects pays us back ten times over in the quality of the end product.

Delivering work that is defect free is always the goal. Defect free in the context of commercial plumbing means work that will be enduring and remain defect free over the long term.

Dodgy plumbing sits like a ticking time bomb, hidden behind walls and under floors.

We all know the horror stories of apartment buildings and so on with defective plumbing and drainage work, costing millions to remediate and ruining lives and businesses in the process. That is never going to be us, because we make sure we have the right systems, the right people with the right skills and training, and the right QA processes in place to make sure of it.

Geschke Plumbing, which was founded by John and Steven's father Brian all the way back in 1951, has grown in capability and reputation over the decades. The company is now equipped to take on projects of virtually any scale and size. Over the past decade or so, Geschke has carved out an expertise in hospitals and other specialised installations.

John says the scale and size of projects can take a bit of getting used to, from a commercial risk point of view, but he is undaunted:

"At the end of the day, everything in life involves an element of risk. That's especially the case in business. In the part of the commercial sector we operate in, we are talking sometimes \$40M plus jobs, so there is always a risk that you get the pricing a bit wrong or something else goes wrong and it ends up costing you \$42M. That can happen, but that is business. It can be risky".

John says he can live with those risks because he and his partners are in the Industry for the long term: "We are not trying to crush down quotes to win work like some others. We are not looking for huge margins either. We trade on our quality and on delivering defect-free work. And the next generation is coming through".

"My son David works full time in the business as does Steven's son Mark and his daughter Meg and Gareth's son Ben is a plumber with us too. We have been around for over 70 years, and we plan on being around for many more".

The importance of building positive relationships, through being direct, open and solutions focused, is, according to John, something that cannot be overstated. This is particularly important in terms of the relationship between plumber and designer, and a key reason John joined the AHSCA:

"Historically, in my time in the Industry, the relationships between the key players - designers, plumbing contractors, and employee representatives - were not great. They were often characterised by distrust and conflict. That has changed significantly and for the better".

"Mark Alexander, and others, have worked hard to open up the AHSCA to more plumbers to try and build those relationships. And it is working. Designers and plumbers work much more collaboratively than they used to and that is good for the Industry as a whole and for consumers who get a better result".

The AHSCA extends its congratulations to John and all the team at Geschke Plumbing Contractors. We also wish to thank John Geschke for his ongoing contribution to the Industry and to the AHSCA, where he has played a key role in building relationships between plumbing contractors and designers.

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




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
